The Austrian Scholars Conference is the international, interdisciplinary meeting of the Austrian School, and for scholars interested or working in this intellectual tradition, it is the event of the year. The director of the conference is Joseph Salerno of Pace University.

In three full days, the ASC offers eighty plus presentations on economics, history, philosophy, and the humanities, in addition to named lectures by the leaders in the field. It combines all the opportunities of a professional meeting, with the added attraction of hearing and presenting new and innovative research, engaging in vigorous debate, and interacting with excellent scholars who share research interests.

This year will have a special focus on the 75th anniversary of the publication of Lionel Robbins's *Nature and Significance of Economic Science*, and the 50th anniversary of Ludwig von Mises's *Theory and History*. In recognition of these anniversaries there will be panel discussions on the influence of each of these works on the development of modern economic thought. Participation will be limited to four or five panelists for each work. While formal papers are not required, the panelists are invited to write up their remarks and submit the paper to symposia that will be published in the QJAE. If you wish to participate in either panel, please send an email to the addresses below.

Those who wish to present other papers at the ASC 2007 should submit a proposal. Submissions include the following categories:

1. Individual papers. Please submit an abstract of 250 words and include title of paper and institutional affiliation of the author(s). For papers on economics, also include JEL codes and keywords. You should also indicate whether you are willing to serve as a chair or discussant on another session.
2. Paper sessions. You are welcome to organize a full session. Session organizers should submit the theme or title of the session along with the names and institutional affiliations of the participants, including the chair and discussants, if any. Abstracts of papers in the proposed session, containing information indicated above, should also be submitted by the organizer or by the individual presenters.
3. Organized symposia. Organized symposia include panelists speaking on a common theme or issue, but without formal papers. To propose an organized symposium please submit a description of the theme or title of the session along with the names and institutional affiliations of the participants, including the chair and discussants, if any.
